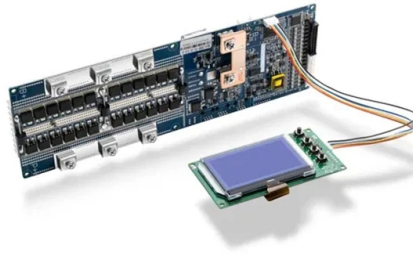

The National Electrical Code (NEC) mandates separation of high-power and low-power cables to prevent electromagnetic interference (EMI) and maintain system safety. Multiconductor power cables rated over 600 volts must be installed in a separate cable tray or with a solid fixed barrier when near lower-voltage cables, while certain types of metal-clad (MC) cables can be mixed with lower-voltage circuits under specific conditions (NEC 318-6(f), 318-9(a)(1)). Limited energy circuits, such as data or control wiring, are also subject to separation rules under NEC Articles 725, 760, and 805.

Practical Installation Guidelines

- Layered Layouts: In industrial settings, electrical (high-voltage) trays are typically positioned above instrumentation or low-voltage trays to minimize EMI.
- Minimum Spacing: Industry standards recommend at least 12 inches (300 mm) of vertical separation between power and control trays, though dividers or partitions can reduce this distance if space is constrained.
- Physical Barriers: Solid or metal dividers within a tray can provide effective separation when sharing a tray is unavoidable, preventing voltage crossover and si...
