Layer 2 switches forward frames based on MAC address tables, but they do not include any Time To Live value like IP packets do. If left unresolved, network loops can disrupt communication, slow down network performance, and even crash switches or. Switching loops occur when network switches are connected together in such a way that network traffic loops around infinitely instead of traversing the hops needed to travel from source to destination. They can take down an entire network.
