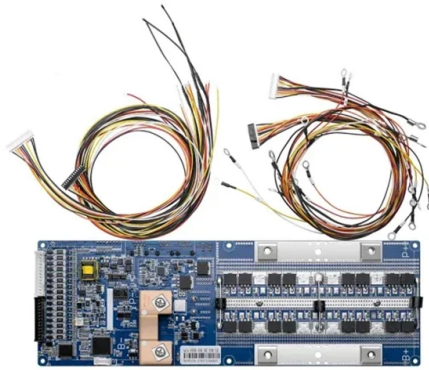


Why is the live wire in the distribution box energized



Overview

The wire remains energized, or “hot,” with this voltage relative to the earth ground, regardless of whether a switch is turned on or an appliance is drawing current. To make electricity flow, a complete path, or circuit, is necessary, which is why the live wire is always paired. Safety-related work practices shall be employed to prevent electric shock or other injuries resulting from either direct or indirect electrical contacts, when work is performed near or on equipment or circuits which are or may be energized. (i) Except as provided in paragraph (b) (3) (ii) of this section, at least two employees shall be present while any employees. IMO, both examples are live and would require proper gear however it is rarely done. Unfortunately with the design of panels in the US turning the main breaker off may help with safety but it does not eliminate all the risks as the wire and lugs on the breaker are still live. Working on energized electrical equipment is a high-risk task performed only when required by the job and after the employer and qualified persons have followed the preferred practice of de-energizing the circuit and documented that de-energizing is infeasible or creates greater hazards, per NFPA. To get verified, send a photo to the mods that has your certificate/seal/card. Block out all identifying information. Once verified delete the image. You as a student should not be doing this at all.
